The Pope reminds us that more than 50 years ago when the world was confronted with a nuclear crisis Pope St. John XXIII wrote an Encyclical 'Pachem in Terris' which rejected war and offered a proposal of peace to all people of good will. Eight years later Blessed Pope Paul VI referred to the ecological concern as a "tragic consequence" of unchecked human activity — an ill-considered exploitation of nature, which could result in the whole humanity becoming victims of such degradation. And now, Pope Francis reflects, faced as we are with global environmental deterioration, this Encyclical 'Laudato Si', is an attempt to "enter into dialogue with all people about our common Home"-the EARTH!
